The Jordan River is especially prominent: The Israelites crossed it to enter the Promised Land after God delivered them from slavery, and John baptized Jesus (and many other people) there. The image of crossing the Jordan River has long been a metaphor for death — crossing from earthly to heavenly life, from worldly struggles to the bliss of God's kingdom, from physical ailments to the wholeness of a resurrection body.
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I came up with a good question at a lunch lab at Annual Conference in Roanoke last week. That question was:

If we could bring a team to partner with you, how would you lead us?

"Ears to the Ground: Community Listening" was the title of the lunch lab, and the instructor was Brittany Bethel. Bethel led a discussion of asset-based community development that emphasized "doing with" as opposed to "doing for," which is a great approach to mission. She invited us to see our communities as resourceful and capable and to let community members lead the way.

I sat at a table of five with two pastors that I knew, Ann Tang from Resurrection UMC and David Jimenez-Cardenas from Memorial UMC. We were given a choice of real-world scenarios to consider and we chose this one: "Your church wants to help a school in an under-resourced neighborhood. Instead of assuming what they need, how can you learn from the students, teachers, and families about their strengths and desires?" I came up with the question above.

Imagine what it would look like if Oaklette asked this question of College Park Elementary School, or Norfolk Highlands Elementary School, or Thurgood Marshall Elementary School? How do you think the students, teachers, and families might react? Debbie Rippard and Don Moody have helped us approach this question with Norfolk Highlands Elementary School. Please look for ways we can add more disciples to such teams.
