

As I wrote Tuesday night in a Facebook post about Bible study, Paul offers a lot of contrasts in writing about the fruit of the spirit. Before listing "love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control," Paul catalogs, "sexual immorality, impurity, sensuality, idolatry, sorcery, enmities, strife, jealousy, outbursts of anger, selfish ambition, dissensions, factions, envying, drunkenness, carousing, and things like these," all of which he calls the deeds of the flesh. Paul also notes, "if you bite and devour one another, beware that you are not consumed by one another," and, "I wish that those who are upsetting you would even mutilate themselves." Ouch!

Could it be that Paul writes about such contrasts because he wants to illustrate an alternative? Jealousy, outbursts of anger, factions, and envy aren't exactly unknown commodities, so maybe what Paul means to say is that there's another route, where such things are replaced with patience, faithfulness, kindness, and self-control.

I thought about this while reading Ephesians 5:1, 13-25 this morning. I also noticed that while we tend to say, "fruits of the spirit," Paul writes of "the fruit of the spirit." I wonder if he wrote in the singular to imply that we should manifest all of the fruit, and not just part of the list. Maybe it's good to think about this in the singular.
